

In 1930, Charles P. Skreko lived at 5820 West Warwick Avenue in the Portage Park neighborhood. Another team member was Carl H. Peterson who went to Lane Tech High School. He was one of the quarterbacks in the late 20's for the Northwest Triangles. They were one of the teams in the "Prairie Football" league. Most of the Chicago Parks and some suburbs like Schiller Park, Cicero, Maywood, and Evanston had teams in this league. The Northwest Triangles were also a competitive ice skating team. - NWCHS

The Early Masons of Chicago's Northwest Side Revisited John Groenier

On September 21, 1879, John Groenier was born to Ubbo Groenier and Johanna Jayer in Gorredijk, Holland. John immigrated to America with his family at three years old and went to school in Jefferson Park. He graduated from Jefferson High School in 1896.

By 1900, the family was living at what is now 5153 Argyle Avenue, across the street from the future location of Jean Baptiste Beaubien Elementary School. John was employed as a schoolteacher.

Groenier was a Mason and was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Jefferson Masonic Association during the building of the Masonic Temple on Gale Street. He was Past Master of Providence lodge, No. 711, A. F. & A. M.; Fellowship Chapter, No. 235, R. A. N. and Past Patron in Providence Chapter, No. 287, O. E. S.

In 1914, John married Margaret Kirchhoff and the following year he built his bride a fine bungalow at 4706 N. Laramie, located across the alley from Margaret's parents house.

To this day, John was best known for photos he had taken of the Jefferson Park area. It is said the Charles R. Childs was Chicago's first documentary photographer starting in 1908 and continuing through 1912, but we believe John Groenier may have had a head start on Charles. Charles Childs had produced over 5,000 Chicago images on penny post cards, but John Groenier produced hundreds of glass negatives just in the Jefferson Park area. 83-year-old John Groenier died on September 3, 1963, and he is buried at Union Ridge

Mystery Photo? - Mystery Solved!

In the July 2009 issue of the Northwest Chicago Historical Society Newsletter, we published this photo asking about the identity these people and the location of this house. We now have all the answers.

The house is still standing and located at 5157 W. Strong (southeast corner of Strong & Laramie). We can tell it is a 2 flat by the 2 doorbells in the photo. The old address is posted above the doorbells; therefore, the photo was taken before the address change of 1909

Joseph H. Swart worked as a carpenter and is sitting on the left. His wife Mary Swart, (nee Groenier) a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and Altui Club of Jefferson Park, is sitting in the middle with their two boys, Harvey Swart and Hubert Swart. They lived at this address when the photo was taken.

Mary Swart's younger brother John Groenier is sitting on the right and her older brother August Groenier is sitting at the top. The photo was taken in 1908 and their approximate ages in 1908 are: August Groenier, 36; Mary Groenier Swart, 34; John Groenier, 29; Joseph Swart, 34; Harvey Swart, 4; and Hubert Swart, 3.

Henry Wulff was born on August 24, 1854, in Schleswig Holstein, Germany. At nine years old, he came to the Town of Jefferson with his parents, Claus F. Wulff and Katherine Schmook. Henry was educated in the public schools in Jefferson and graduated from Dyrenfurth's College in Chicago. He married Katherine Ehglehardt of Chicago in Jefferson on December 28, 1874.

They had five children, two of whom died before the age of ten. Frederick Wulff, who was born in 1884, died when he was eleven years old. Two daughters survived into adulthood, Nellie and Lillie. Lillian M. Wulff graduated from Jefferson High School in 1895 and married Robert E. Maypole in 1902. Nellie K. Wulff married John Ray McGurren. Today there are no living descendants of Henry Wulff.

Henry Wulff was a Republican and started out his political career as Deputy Sheriff of Cook County in 1878. Still acting as Deputy Sheriff, he was elected to the Board of Trustees for the Town of Jefferson and later became president of the Board, where he served two terms. Over the next 10 years, he served in multiple capacities: on the Jefferson Finance Committee, as a delegate at the Republican National Convention at Minneapolis, as Treasurer of the Jefferson Street Railway Company, as and President of the Double Eagle Mining Company. In addition, he was elected Illinois State Treasurer and twice as Clerk of Cook County. In 1900, he became Alderman in the City Council. Henry Wulff was never defeated in any election.

Henry Wulff was a Knight Templar Mason, belonging to Siloam Commandery. He also held membership with the Independent Order of Foresters, the Order of Red Men and the Knights of Pythias.

The Wulff family lived at 4923 N. Milwaukee Avenue, the location of the Jefferson Park Bus Terminal. For a picture of his house, see Newsletter July 2007 - Henry Wulff - Political Pioneer, (avail-



After a long illness, Henry Wulff died on December 27, 1902, at the Robert Burns Hospital at Washington Boulevard and Garfield Park in Chicago. His wife Katherine died in Chicago on March 7, 1941. They are both buried in Union Ridge Cemetery.

Luther North High School

For over a century Luther High School North has contributed to church and society. In the early 1900's a group of first and second-generation German Lutheran immigrants who had settled in various parts of the metropolitan area combined their resources to establish one of the first Lutheran high schools in the world (preceded only by the Milwaukee Lutheran High School, 1903.) The concept of a group of local congregations pooling their resources to provide an education beyond elementary school was unique and excit-

Luther High School North originated as Luther Institute, located until the early 1950's on Woods Street on the west side of Chicago's Loop. The proud traditions held even today by the graduates of that school evidence the power of the Spirit as many laymen and women; clergy and commissioned teachers trace their roots to Luther Institute. The tradition was so valued that when the building in which Luther Institute was housed was scheduled for an urban renewal project, the city of Chicago wisely planned new locations to accommodate the burgeoning Lutheran community. Of the three emergent Lutheran high schools in the Chicago area, Luther North was the first and largest, opening its doors in 1953.



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



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
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By the late 1960's, Luther North's student enrollment exceeded even the largest years of Luther Institute's student enrollment. By 1971, Luther High School North (built for 1000 potential students) had grown to almost 1400 students and was the largest Lutheran high school in the world.

The school is now named Luther North College Prep with many exciting developments in the Business, Fine Arts, and Health Sciences academies. The present location (5700 West Berteau) of Luther North has served the northwest side of Chicago and the suburbs for over 50 years. Ten thousand graduates of Luther North have built a legacy of academic excellence, spiritual growth, and athletic and fine arts achievements. It is certain that graduates will continue to serve church and society as productive and responsible Christian servant-leaders.

Spencer Coal Field (stadium) at 4200 N. Central Avenue (1934 to 1943). It was home to Semi-professional baseball, softball (both men and women) and football teams. The field had lights for night games. Local high school football teams also played here. In winter, the field was flooded for ice-skating. In August of 1940, Jesse Owens, Olympic champion, gave a demonstration of his running ability between games at Spencer Field by running against a motorcycle for 100 yards.



This photo from 1910 depicts two young children on a donkey. At the time, it was a very common practice to take photos of children on a pony or donkey. We know where the photo was taken and the names of the children.

The house is located in the Logan Square neighborhood at 2956 Belden Avenue. The two boys in the photo are sons of Fredrick and Satten Litzel: 5-year-old Pierre and 3-year-old Fredrick.

A special thanks to the Masons at the Jefferson Masonic Temple for inviting us to join the celebration of the 100-year anniversary of the Gale Street building.

Self-guided historical tours were conducted and numerous historic documents were displayed. Mason members helped to found the Town of Jefferson and played important rolls in the history of the northwest side.

The contents of the 100-yearold cornerstone time capsule from the building were on display. The Jefferson Masonic Temple is Chicago's oldest building used exclusively for Masonic groups.
